# Essa goes ahead with new storage building

Essa council has approved the construction of a new salt and sand storage building at the township's roads garage on County Road 56.

The building will be built by Domm Construction of Ayton at a total cost of \$733,289.

Domm's bid, which was the lowest one received by the township, came in above the

estimated cost which was set at \$600,000 in this year's budget but council agreed to move ahead with the project. The building is larger than originally proposed in order to allow Simcoe county's salt and sand in the building.

Township CAO/Public Works manager Greg Murphy said that the province has been encouraging all municipalities to construct salt and sand storage buildings as a means of reducing salt run off from outdoor piles.

"It will eliminate that problem and allow us to store any surplus sand and salt over the summer months," he said.

The township has had discussions with Simcoe county about them contributing funds towards the building's construction which would allow them to store their roads department salt and sand in the building.

The township will also be using funding that it is receiving from the federal government under its gasoline tax rebate program towards the building's construction.

## Notice of Application of Larvicide for Mosquito Control Town of Innisfil

From June 25, 2007 to September 1st, 2007 the Town of Innisfil under the authority of the Simcoe Muskoka Medical Officer of Health will conduct a program to control mosquito larvae (immature mosquitoes) in standing water in order to prevent their development into potential carriers of West Nile virus. The program will be carried out in the Alcona area.

The larvicide Altosid XR Briquets PCP#27694 is a registered larvicide approved for use by the federal government. This application will be carried out by Ministry of the Environment licensed applicators or trained technicians. Altosid XR Briquets PCP#27694 will be applied by direct hand application to catch basins of storm drains in the following area Lake Simcoe West to the 20th Sideroad and from just South of the 7th Line to just North of the 10th Line.

## Blue box, composter sales disappoint

Simcoe County's recent sale of discounted composters and recycling boxes proved a little disappointing.

County councillors at the Corporate Services committee learned last week that, unlike previous sales, neither the composters nor recycling boxes sold out at the events held on June 2 at three locations through the county including Alliston.

Rob McCullough, manager of environmental services, said that "staff had anticipated that the truckload sales event would have resulted in the sale of 3,000 backyard composters and 5,500 recycling boxes. The actual number sold was 1,188 composters and 4,347 recycling boxes."

McCullough said that the sales were not helped when Canada Post failed to deliver flyers to many households on time. He

added that the very hot weather on the day of sale did not help either.

The county will place the remaining recycling boxes in its inventory and is discussing with Norseman Plastics to take back the remaining backyard composters.
